What is a drum corps?

Modern drum corps are comprised of 165 performers who range in age from about 14 to 21. Each corps is made up of brass musicians, percussionists and a colorguard. They perform a 12-minute program on a standard football field. Programs are extravaganzas of musical excellence, marching precision, color, drama, dance and emotion. All members of the corps (except the front percussion ensemble) march in intricate formations which are coordinated with the musical productions.

Brass musicians in The Troopers play on top-quality Adams Marching Brass trumpets, mellophones, baritones, and tubas.

Percussion instruments include Pearl marching snare drums, tenor drums (often referred to as "quads" or "quints"), bass drums in five sizes and stationary Adams "front ensemble" instruments including various drums, cymbals, tympani, mallets (marimba, vibraphone, xylophone and chimes) and electronic synthesizers.

The colorguard adds color and drama through the coordinated use of flags, rifles, sabers and dance. The modern colorquard is as much a dance ensemble and storyteller as it is a precision marching unit.

What are the benefits to the performers?

Drum corps is an activity which attempts to do much more than provide a performance opportunity for students or entertainment for the audience. Through the drum corps experience, students will learn useful life skills such as leadership, goal-setting and teamwork, among others. The Troopers curriculum includes opportunities for students to exercise their potential not only as musicians, but as complete human beings

With that growth has come major expenses and support needs. Whether you are able to volunteer your time, make a major donation or even serve on the Board of Directors, you are the village that will keep the dream moving forward. Join us as we continue this unique mission of excellence and help inspire and raise the leaders of tomorrow.

Chapter 2: Being a Trooper Parent

Your child will learn many things besides improvement of their given talents. They will learn to deal with responsibility, discipline, and organizational skills. They will learn how to deal with disappointment and success. They will travel the country more in one summer than most people do in a lifetime. They will learn how to do their own laundry, manage their money, and clean up after themselves. They will also make friends that will last a lifetime.

The best thing you can do for your child as they embark on this life experience is to support their success, hard work, and dedication. Offer support, be proud of them, and have faith that they will survive this as they learn new life skills. Know that they will return to you in a short time, back to the safety of home and family, with a new family in tow. As a Trooper, they will have another family that will support their success, hard work, and dedication.

Drum corps is a very difficult sport. This world-level competition demands both physical and mental focus. Physical and mental focus becomes critical as the corps marches fast with precision on a large field with a few lines, hitting a spot and then moving again. It is 15 minutes of giving everything they have as they play an instrument or throw a flag with great expertise.

A parent's job is not to sweat the small stuff. There is so much that your child will experience through the course of a Trooper season, trust that your child will learn to deal with what comes their way. When they contact you with their pain, frustration, or self-doubt, continue to be positive and encouraging. Remind them to take their concerns to the Troopers member experience liaison, staff, and Trooper administration. Remind them to lean on their Trooper family. It is time to let the bird out of the nest and watch them fly. Be proud of your achievement as parents. This is your time to watch them soar.

When you want to see, talk, or be with your Trooper as they pass close to you on tour, remember this and ask yourself, "Will my actions distract them?" Their job is to stay focused on the field until they are on break. If they are distracted and miss their spot, they, and others, could be hurt. Imagine them being run over by a fast-moving bass drummer or a swinging tuba ... focus, focus, focus.

Your Trooper is surrounded by people who are there to help them succeed. If you have any concerns, check in with them. If you feel they are struggling (scared, home sick, or just don't sound normal) use the contacts at the end of this handbook to communicate these concerns. Don't panic, communicate.

Boundaries:

As parents, we must respect boundaries. The tour buses are one of the living spaces our Troopers enjoy. This is their private space. Parents are not to be on the buses. There is also a staff bus that is off limits. When volunteering and traveling with the corps, there is a van designated for volunteers. Each member bus will have chaperones onboard.

Another private space for our Troopers is the gym. <u>Parents are not to be in the gym.</u> There will be designated living quarters for the Troopers, staff, and volunteers.

It is important that parents respect these boundaries.

Pictures, Video, and Audio Recordings:

Absolutely <u>NO</u> video or audio recordings of the Troopers music or shows are allowed. This includes periscope, live streaming, and other new technology. Much of the music played has copyright rules. Breaking these rules can have high dollar fines. These fines can be charged to you, the Troopers, and DCI. Please honor these copyright rules.

Parents may take pictures of the Troopers but cannot interfere with rehearsals or performances. Please <u>STAY OFF THE FIELD!</u>

Sharing appropriate pictures on the 2024 TrooParent Facebook page is encouraged. We all have limited access to our Troopers throughout the summer and love to see pictures of them!

As you find pictures of your Trooper posted on the 2024 TrooParent Facebook page, you might consider saving a copy in a file folder. These pictures can be used later for Inspiration Wall posters and mementos for your child.

Chapter 3: Trooper Camps

Auditions generally begin in November or December. At these audition camps, your son or daughter will learn from some of the top instructors in the nation. The costs included are \$185 for each individual camp. This includes instruction, food, airport transportation, and lodging. Once contracted, your son or daughter is expected to attend scheduled weekend camps (January, February, March and the beginning of May).

The dates and locations of these camps will be posted on the Trooper web page and Facebook page. There may also be 1-day auditions. The fees and location of these auditions will be posted on the Trooper web page and Facebook page.

All Audition fees and Camp fees may be paid online via credit or debit card on our website at http://www.TroopersDrumCorps.org/camps

Parents may volunteer at any of these camps. However, there is a process that all adults must adhere to including background checks and mandatory online safety training. You can register to volunteer by using the Volunteer page on the Troopers website.

Regardless of which camp your son or daughter attends, they should bring the following:

- Sleeping bag, pillow and a twin size air mattress or pad
- Comfortable clothing and quality athletic shoes
- Toiletries and a towel
- Personal equipment for rehearsal
- Required section materials as communicated by their caption staff
- 1 gallon water jug

During the audition process, Troopers staff will evaluate the abilities of the individual and how they work as an ensemble. While auditioning at a camp, your son or daughter will get to know the Troopers. They will learn about drum corps and about what it takes to be a part of the Troopers. They will meet new people and will learn from some of the best instructors in the activity. Drum corps is a life-changing experience that will provide a lifetime of memories.

Not just anyone can become a member of the Troopers. While musical and marching ability is important, key requirements are; commitment, desire, a positive attitude and financial responsibility. If your son or daughter has what it takes to become a member of this corps, they will join the Long Blue Line of thousands who have proudly worn the cross-sabers of "America's Corps."

Chapter 4: Tuition

Once a member has been offered a contract to participate in the season, the member must submit these forms within 15 calendar days along with a \$400 non-refundable Participation Deposit.

Members are expected to follow the payment schedule as outlined. NOTE: This tuition schedule has been established based upon the tentative summer tour model as currently outlined.

*In the event that circumstances (such as new, unexpected COVID protocols) cause a substantive change or reduction in that tour model, the final tuition installment may be adjusted and/or reduced accordingly.

What does tuition cover? Tuition covers uniforms/costumes, busing, housing, equipment, spring training expenses, instruction, and a portion of the Troopers annual food budget. Tuition only covers about half of the corps annual budget and does not include the winter camps.

Why is tuition so expensive? Tuition is more expensive this year due to it being a full season, plus the state of inflation, fuel prices, and external expenses outside of our control. However, we are doing a coast-to-coast tour, traveling over 8,000 miles, performing in over 20 events with some pretty incredible free days being planned in major cities along our tour. All busing, food, housing, and fuel is included in this price. When you break it down, this is actually a pretty good opportunity to see the whole country at half the cost it would take to do on your own. In fact, the total actual expense per person is over \$10,000. We're starting you off with a pretty hefty scholarship. Plus you have some of the greatest instructors in the world, and you'll be performing in some of the most spectacular venues in America. To see where we are traveling, CLICK HERE.

What do the fees include?

- Summer instruction
- Housing
- Uniforms
- Equipment
- Transportation while on tour
- Food
- Various Corps insurance policies

Tuition for the this season does not include:

- Laundry money
- Snacks and drinks outside of the Food Truck
- Spending money on souvenirs, etc...
- Spending money during laundry days meals
- Spending money on your days off.
- Transportation to move-in.
- Transportation home after the season is over.

Your payment schedule may look different if you sign at a later date.

Tuition Refund Policy:

For cancellations made on or before May 6th, a full refund will be issued minus the nonrefundable deposit of \$400.

Cancellations made after May 6th will be subject to the following reductions and are based on payments due as outlined within the 2024 Tuition & Fee Schedule Payment Schedule.

For cancellations made between May 7th and June 3rd, a 50% refund will be issued minus the nonrefundable deposit of \$400.

For cancellations made between June 4th and July 8th, a 25% refund will be issued minus the nonrefundable deposit of \$400.

No refunds will be issued for cancellations made on or after July 9th.

Note: Refunds will be made directly to the member for direct payments made by members/guardians. Monies collected through sponsorships are nonrefundable and will be converted to credits in the Troopers' yearly scholarship fund to benefit another member.

Note: If returning Members are not in good financial standing from previous years they are not permitted to audition or participate in the Troopers or any other DCI member corps for the current season. If a member is discovered to have debt at another organization, the director of that organization has the right to file a complaint through DCI and have the member removed from participation. Please be sure that you are in good standing not only with the Troopers, but all other DCI member corps.

Chapter 5: Move Ins and Spring Training

Move Ins Registration and information will be available at www.troopersDrumCorps.org once final details are put into place. This information will also be emailed to contracted members, and communicated through the organization's SLACK communications platform that members have access to. Move Ins date is scheduled for Saturday, June 1st in Casper, WY.

Call one of us in any case of emergency while at the airport, in transit to Kelly Walsh High School or at any other time throughout the day.

Flying into Denver International Airport (June 1st)

To ensure you're able to catch the 2:00pm shuttle we encourage you to arrive at the Denver Airport before 12:00pm MST. If those tickets are out of your price range/flight times on Saturday, June 1st, you might consider flying into Denver on Friday, May 31st and staying at a hotel overnight. Many area hotels offer free shuttles to/from the airport.

After you land, head to baggage claim at the Jeppesen Terminal, Level 5. Member Leadership will be posted to meet you along the way and direct you where to go after retrieving your luggage. They will also be taking roll as you arrive. For any questions at the airport, contact information for our member leadership team is provided below.

Two/Three buses will be departing from the Denver Airport at 2:00pm. At 1:45pm the group will move to the holding area for transportation pickup. Plan on eating before leaving the airport because there is a 4 hour drive to Casper, WY. Feel free to bring snacks as needed.

If your flight is delayed and you will miss the shuttle because of the delay, please send a slack message to Michael Gough and Mary Duerkop to communicate this issue and we will let you know how to proceed. You can also call using the phone numbers listed at the top of this document.

If you schedule a flight to Denver that arrives after the shuttle has departed, the corps will be unable to transport you to Casper, WY. Please ensure that you arrive as early as possible on Saturday, June 1st so that you're able to catch the shuttle.



Flying into Casper-Natrona County Airport (June 1st)

We will do 1 or 2 shuttle runs (depending on numbers flying into Casper) at 5:30pm MST. In order to ensure you make the shuttle, please plan on arriving in Casper before 4:30pm MST. If your flight gets in later than 5:30pm and you miss the shuttle you'll need to provide your own transportation to Kelly Walsh High School by taxi/uber/ride share.

Additional Travel Details (June 1st)

If you are driving yourself to/from camp or if you are being dropped off, **do not arrive at Kelly Walsh High School until 6:00pm**. Check in will begin at 6:00pm.

Moving In Late (after June 1st)

All members who are moving in late must book a flight into the Casper-Natrona County Airport (CPR) and communicate this late arrival with Mike and Mary to arrange for a possible shuttle. The corps may not be able to provide a ride from the airport, if that's the case, you will need to be prepared to get a taxi/uber/rideshare to Kelly Walsh High School.

Late arrivals must be communicated to all Caption Heads, and the absences must be excused by Caption Heads.

Leaving Spring Training/Returning to Spring Training ***only for those who are leaving/returning due to excused absences

All members must book a flight into the Casper-Natrona County Airport (CPR) and communicate their flight information with Mike and Mary to arrange for a possible shuttle. The corps may not be able to provide a ride from the airport, if that's the case, you will need to be prepared to get a taxi/uber/rideshare to the Casper Airport/Kelly Walsh High School.

All absences must be communicated to all Caption Heads, and the absences must be excused by Caption Heads.

Communication:

Communication from your child during Spring Training may be very limited. Believe that no news is good news! Spring Training is just as demanding on staff. If you have any concerns or just want someone to check in on your child, use the contacts listed in Chapter 10: Who to Call. Do not hesitate to call. You can also post a request on the 2024 TrooParent Facebook page and a parent volunteer can also help.

<u>Uniform Fitting:</u>

During spring camps, measurements are taken of every Trooper. Final fittings are done during Spring Training. As the members rehearse, many of them tone up and lose weight. Uniforms need to be altered. The Troopers' lead seamstress and other volunteers work to alter uniforms throughout the summer.

Please know that the administration does everything possible to keep all Troopers looking good on the field. Your Trooper is responsible to report any issues with the uniforms to the appropriate people.

While there will likely be a preview event prior to the start of the tour, the Troopers 2024 DCI Tour will begin on Friday, July 5th in Portland, Oregon and will conclude with the Troopers Awards Ceremony at "The Farm" on Sunday, August 11th in Lebanon, Indiana.

Attending Performances:

It is wise to purchase your tickets ahead of time. If you want to see the designs and layout of the performance, select seats that are high and at the 50-yard line. If you want a more intimate feeling with the music, select a seat closer to the field. We encourage you to experience both options.

Parents sometimes sit together in a block. Check the Facebook page for who is attending shows and where they are sitting.

Purchase a yellow bandana to tie to belt loop / purse strap for parents to recognize each other at shows. Kind of a Troopers gang sign! Ha!

What to Expect During Tour:

During the tour, your Trooper continues rehearsal blocks. These rehearsals are in the morning before a show and on non-show days. These days are just as demanding as rehearsals during Spring Training.

Expect little contact. They are very busy and very tired at the end of the day. Don't worry if they do not respond to your texts or calls right away.

Be prepared for the home sick, "I'm ready to quit", "I want to come home, calls." It happens to every kid at one point or another. Heck, it even happens to the adults! The road life is tough, and it makes people tough. Listen and encourage them to talk to their section leader or the member experience liaison.

Consumption of alcohol or being under the influence of any illegal substances while with the program at a rehearsal facility, school campus, in your vehicle, or on tour will NOT be tolerated and is grounds for immediate dismissal.

Laundry Days and Supplies:

There are approximately 5 designated days for laundry. The members are dropped off at laundromats and are expected to do their laundry. Once finished, the buses will pick them up. Generally we also do a Walmart run during Laundry days so that they can restock on personal items.

If your Trooper runs out of supplies, don't hesitate to ask for help on the 2024 TrooParent Facebook page. Parents are willing to help one another and purchase supplies your Trooper may need.

Uniforms are washed by parent volunteers. These laundry days are scheduled by Trooper administration. If you are available to help on the Wash Crew please let the corps director

or uniform manager know once the dates are posted to the TrooParents Facebook page.

Mail Drop:

Your Trooper will appreciate a message from home. Consider sending a card or a care package! Although a treat is nice, be careful not to send too many sweets. The Food Crew works hard to serve meals that have high-nutritional value and will sustain their bodies for their hours of work. Individuals approved by Troopers administration have volunteered to have packages mailed to their homes or businesses and will deliver all packages received by the posted deadline to the Troopers. The list will be posted on the Troopers web page once designated locations are determined.

If you mail any packages, please watch for the Mail-Drop List to avoid mailing packages after the corps has left. Any late packages will not be delivered to your Trooper.

DO NOT send mail to any housing site.

Parades:

Periodically, the corps will march in a parade. This information is posted on Facebook as opportunities are scheduled. Currently, no parades are planned for the 2024 season.

Troopers Alumni:

Troopers Alumni make up The Long Blue Line and are an important part of The Troopers organization. The current Troopers love to hear their stories of how things were "back in the day". Alumni often plan gatherings at regional performances and during finals week in which they invite parents. We will share this information on the Trooparents Facebook page. They also plan special meals to feed our Troopers at several stops during the tour and will be performing with The Troopers during Casper Week.

One of the big fundraisers for the Alumni is the "On the Road Again" campaign. The Alumni purchase a yearly commemorative coin and are partnered up with a current member. They are encouraged to contact their members and become a cheerleader of sorts throughout the season.

Troopers Legacy Corps:

The Troopers Legacy Corps, founded in 2018 has grown to about 220 members last year and performed in Indianapolis last summer. They will be continuing operations this year and are working coordinating a performance this season. Details TBA.

Chapter 7: Volunteering

We HIGHLY recommend volunteering. While you are probably not going to see much of your Trooper, you will get to experience, first hand, the hard work and dedication it takes to be a Trooper. There are many opportunities to get involved, whether it be for a few days or a few weeks, the Troopers would love to have you!! Volunteers are truly the backbone of the Trooper organization. Anyone who has traveled with the corps will tell you it is a highly rewarding experience.

The Troopers need your help for the 2024 Tour. Please look over your summer schedules and see when you can volunteer. Your help is needed and appreciated. If you plan to volunteer this season, please be aware that you will have to follow our health and safety guidelines. In addition, a background check and online SafeSport Volunteer training courses may be required.

<u>Typical Volunteer Roles:</u>

Spring Training: Cook Crew, Airport Runners, and Uniforms Crew

During Summer Tour: Cook Crew, Uniform Crew, Wash Crews, and Drivers

Volunteers sleep on the floor and will shower in locker rooms during designated times when the membership is not using them. Remember to bring your towel and shower shoes!

Chapter 8: Finals Week

Rehearsals:

"The Farm" is open to visitors during finals week. Just remember that all of the same rules apply to this location as any other rehearsal space.

Inspiration Wall:

The Troopers will end the tour at "The Farm" for their final rehearsal days to prepare for finals. On a day before their final performances, the volunteers will hang up posters and pictures sent by friends and family. These items will be hung on a wall inside the eating shelter. This is the "Inspiration Wall." The intention is to remind our Troopers of how far they have come and how we all support them.

If you would like to contribute to the "Inspiration Wall," there will be postings toward the end of the summer with instructions on where to send your poster. It isn't necessary to spend money on these posters. Homemade posters are the best.

Chapter 12: Trooper Acronyms

BIS – "Butt in Seat" is the time given by the administration that your Trooper should be in his or her bus seat. When visiting with your Trooper, be sure to honor this expectation.

Wagons Ho! - This means, it's time to go. Roll out.

Block – Is a group of seats at a stadium. Parents sometimes preorder a block of tickets in which you pay them for your ticket. By doing this, you get the opportunity to sit with other Trooper family, alumni, and fans.

EPL – Eat, Pack, Load While on tour this will be posted on the daily schedule. This is the time after rehearsal and before leaving a housing site heading to a performance.

Food Truck – Is the truck where all meals are prepared and served.

Free Days – Are a few scheduled days during tour when the Troopers have several hours "off". These dates will be announced throughout the tour. The Troopers enjoy having down time with one another, going to a restaurant, a movie, and shopping. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19, these days will look very different in 2021.

HLD - Troopers live by these words "Honor, Loyalty, Dedication."

On the Line – The time the corps is on the line, ready to perform.

Rehearsal Block – Typically a 4-hour block of time in which the Troopers rehearse

The Farm – Boone County 4-H Fairgrounds in Lebanon, IN. The site the Troopers return to at the end of tour. The address is 1300 East 100 South Lebanon, IN 46052

Vet – Troopers or parents who have been with Troopers for more than one year

Chapter 13: Suggestions from Parents of Trooper Veterans

- Have your new Trooper ask for, and act on all advice offered from vets! They should ask what to pack, attitude, water intake, etc.
- Pack light!
- When packing laundry supplies, use a plastic pencil box to hold a Ziploc with 6 or so pods, dryer sheets, and \$30 worth of quarters. You can also use washer/dryer sheets and put a few in a Ziploc bag with \$4 in quarters. You can make 5 Ziploc baggies for the season.
- Good shoes and physical therapy tape make for a smoother season.
- Pack extra underwear and socks. They are more important than a clean t-shirt each day.
- Take lots of sunscreen AND sunglasses!
- Buy good shoes. Asics seem to be a popular brand.
- Must have good shoes WITH good support inserts! Spenco Polysorb Cross Trainer Insoles are recommended.
- They are a Trooper. They stay with the group on tour. No hotel with the family or dinner at a restaurant with the parents, unless they are on rare free time. We can do this September through April.
- When you get the homesick phone call, tell them they can do this and encourage them to talk with their section leader.
- No news is good news, especially during spring training.
- Expect limited cell phone calls and communication during Spring Training as the kids' time is really limited.
- Be respectful of boundaries set by Troopers administration. All boundaries are set for the safety of your Trooper and productiveness of the show.
- Your Trooper is tougher than you think. They CAN survive without you.
- Do not be reactive to texts or phone calls you receive from your marching member - as tempting as it might be to do so - ALWAYS confirm with the Troopers Office before panicking. Do not rely on other section parents for accurate and/or up-to-date information.
- If your Trooper contacts you with a problem, encourage them to go to their member advocate first. Section leader, administration, or parent volunteers are also available to help.
- Follow and access TrooParents Facebook frequently.
- Positivity at all times! Support your Trooper, the staff, and the organization.

- As pictures of your Trooper come across the Facebook newsfeed, right click on them and save them to a folder on your computer. When it's time to make the Inspiration Wall posters, it's so much easier to have the pictures all in one place and your son or daughter will have a great time looking through them when they return from tour.
- Mail drops! Send goodies but remember to send small stuff. There is limited space on the bus and in their suitcases. Even if it is only a card, send something to each mail drop. If a friend is going to a show and asks if they can take something to your Trooper, a Gatorade, a box of snacks and a few dollars goes a long way.
- Soaking the yellow sweat stained socks and t-shirts in BIZ gets them white again.
- When the packing list says bring a jacket or a hoodie, DON'T ignore that. This is especially important for the Texas (and maybe Florida) Troopers. The temps do not account for wind or rain, and it doesn't matter if you're hot-natured. You WILL need a hoodie.
- Pack more sunscreen & bug spray than you think is humanly possible to use.
- Have a jacket for inside Lucas Oil. Cause I always freeze!
- Spring Training in June can also get a bit chilly. Members should have a good jacket for those cold evening rehearsals, especially if we are in Wyoming.
